To support the learners to become religiously literate, this unit will provide opportunities to: Explore stories from religious traditions and find out about attitudes to the natural world EXPLORE Learners should be able to identify faith groups that people might belong to and to suggest what difference that might make to the lives of believers ENGAGE Learners should be able to recall activities around belonging to faith	<u>Context of study:</u> This unit builds on previous learning around Christian and Islam. This unit helps children explore the importance of stories and what they can learn from them . By examining religious and personal experiences, the children will consider why books are important to them as well as other people both of faith and those not of faith. The children already know about the Bible and Qur'an and know that these are significant books of Christians and Muslims. The children also have an understanding of the comparison between the two religions (KS1.CA.T2.2) <u>Crucial Knowledge:</u> To know that books are special to people. To know that people often have favourite books that they enjoy reading and feel connected to. Know that books can entertain, teach lessons, and help people understand the world around them. Know that some books are special because they remind people of important memories or feelings.

To know where they keep it safe, how they treat it and how they look after it.</p> <p>To know that the Qur'an is a special book for Muslims.</p> <p>To know they wash their hands before they touch it (Wudu)</p> <p>To know where Muslims keep the Qur'an, how they treat it and how they look after it.</p> <p>To know that the Qur'an is written in Arabic.</p> <p><u>Stories with meaning</u></p> <p>Christianity:</p> <p>To know that in the Bible there are stories called psalms. These stories have meanings.</p> <p>To know the story of the lost sheep (Luke 15, v1-7)</p> <p>To know that the story teaches Christians about God.</p> <p>Know that the story of the Lost Sheep is a parable told by Jesus to teach people about God's love and care.</p> <p>Know that in the story, a shepherd leaves 99 sheep to find the one that is lost, showing that every individual is important.</p> <p>Know that the shepherd represents God, and the lost sheep represents a person who has gone off the right path.</p> <p>Know that the story teaches that God never gives up on people, no matter how far they stray.</p> <p>Islam:</p> <p>Know that Muslims believe Allah is the Creator of the world and everything in it.</p> <p>Know that verses (suras) from the Qur'an: <i>What can stories tell you about important things in life? Read part of a sura (e.g. "Look at the birds, held poised in the midst of the air. Nothing holds them up but the power of Allah" ; 88: 17-20 "Look at the camels how they are created and at the sky how it is raised high, and at the mountains how they are fixed firm, and at the earth how it is spread out")</i></p> <p>Know that Allah is seen as powerful, wise, and caring – holding up the birds, creating the mountains, and spreading out the earth.</p> <p>Know that creation is a sign of Allah's presence, and Muslims are encouraged to reflect on the natural world to grow in faith and thankfulness.</p> <p>Know that the Qur'an teaches Muslims to respect the world and all living things because they are made by Allah.</p>
